
Welcome to the April newsletter.

Quick updates

- In March we sold out of the Artisan Hand Tips (an alternative to the bobbin if you need just the pointy end and not the yarn carrying end) made by Andrew Dickinson, again. But he has kindly made seven more unique and individual pieces for us and these are on the website here. To the left is a particularly lovely one from the latest batch embedded with dots of sterling silver.
- For a long time we have had requests for smaller amounts of warp which we are now finally able to provide so you will find 6s fine in 250g cones here, in time we will have all the other warp types in these smaller amounts too.
- During stock take we found a few things we thought we no longer had, most of these are now in special offer yarns here. However, we also found a lovely large amount of Heavy Black yarn (5/2) so this is now available again on the website

New Products and a Story about Goats

We have restocked our Goat Hair Yarn and been able to add a few colours and new thicknesses - fine, thin, and thick. Thin is the weight we used to supply. However as all these yarns are hand spun there is no numeric standard for them and the terms are relative but there is an image of the thicknesses on the website <a href="https://example.com/here.com





The goat hair yarn is from Turkey and we asked how the goats are kept and the hair gathered. The answer is the goats roam freely and graze on high altitude hills and plains. The goats are shorn in May and June. The shepherds follow the herd shearing them as they go, on the go, using traditional scissors, which is a slow-moving but traditional practice. To the right is an image of a typical herd of these lovely goats.

South Hamar Studio, Westray: Weaving Courses and Workshops. Summer 2021 and 2022. Orkney, Scotland

Courses and Workshops with Tapestry Weaver Louise Martin and Stone Carver and Tapestry Weaver Ros Bryant

16 - 20 August 2021. Hazel Moore and Graeme Wilson - Archaeologists who have led many excavations on Westray will arrange visits to known archeological sites. In the field and back in the studio, explore responses within the language of weave.

30 May – 3 June 2022 Through daily excursions to Westray's white sandy beaches or the high, nesting cliffs of Noup islands riches, both past and present will be discovered, with a focus on finding new ways to capture landscape in weave. The course is based in a contemporary studio at South Hamar, a recently restored listed steading with cottages, threshing barn, drying kiln, flagstone and turf roofs. The course is suitable for new or experienced weavers who are keen to explore.

8 - 12 August 2022 An exciting collaboration between a tapestry weaver and a stone carver. This unique workshop draws on both skills, exploring stone in weave and weave on stone and the myriad combinations possible of colour, textures and constructed marks. After initial guided experimentation choose to work further in either medium or both.

Australian Tapestry Workshop: The Kate Derum Award for Small Tapestries and The Irene Davies Emerging Artist Award for Small Tapestries. Entries Open: 25 June – 9 August 2021.

Held every two years by the Australian Tapestry Workshop (ATW) these unique awards celebrate creativity and excellence in contemporary tapestry and are the most prestigious small tapestry awards in Australasia. The Kate Derum Award for Small Tapestries honours Kate Derum and her significant contribution to tapestry. The award is open to all professional Australian and International tapestry artists. The Irene

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Davies Emerging Artist Award for Small Tapestries was established to support early-career weavers in the first five years of their tapestry practice. Artist Profile: Kathe Todd - Hooker

Kathe Todd – Hooker's tapestries are instantly recognisable. She has a love of colour and the study of all things technical in tapestry weaving as well as its historic aspects. She says that "the challenge of weaving and putting together images that are collage like and are symbolically powerful, personal and explosive in small contained spaces - and semi-controlled chaos keeps me

coming back day after day..." Her personal preference is to work at a small scale and a small format and she

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also runs a Facebook group page especially for weavers of small format pieces. Her own work is generally, 20-22 epi and seldom much larger than 15 x 15 inches or much smaller than 100 square inches. Materials are mainly sewing thread and embroidery flosses. Kathe has written a number of useful tapestry technique books and as well as teaching she also designs tapestry equipment. HANDWOVEN Nikyle Begay is a shepherd, weaver, and member of the Diné tribe. While it might be easy to see these as three separate identities, for Nikyle they are inseparable, and each aspect informs the other. Nikyle has chosen to raise traditional Navajo-Churro sheep, thereby helping to preserve the breed. A Day in the Weave of Rebecca Mezoff

Continuing our new feature this month we are privileged to have an insight into the creative practice and weaving life of Rebecca Mezoff. So here in her own words and images is "A Day in the Weave of

Rebecca Mezoff".

My days center around tapestry. I am an artist, an author, and an educator. Much of each day is spent teaching in my online school or if I'm working on a new course, creating the content for that. I might also spend a day making a video for my YouTube channel or writing a blog post about tapestry weaving. Often much of my day is spent at the computer and though I don't always love the screen time, I do love that I can interact with tapestry weavers all over the world every day by teaching in this way.

I spend some dedicated time each week in my weaving studio working on my own ideas and weaving samples or examples for my courses. I am a teacher at heart and there is nothing better than helping

someone figure out the mysteries of tapestry weaving and often what I'm working on in my own artwork has echoes in my teaching at the same time.



My artwork and writing are inspired by time outside. I love nothing more than to stick a snack, a bottle of water, a sketchbook, and a small spindle or loom in my backpack and go for a wander in the mountains of Colorado near my home. Sometimes those adventures last for hours and other times for days or even weeks. I've lived in New Mexico or Colorado, USA for most of my life and the mountain and desert landscapes here influence my thoughts about just about everything, but especially about my artwork.

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I'm currently working on getting the next big tapestry on the loom. It is a design I've been kicking around for years now which is inspired by rock cairns I find on my rambles. I think I'm almost ready to start weaving. My Harrisville Rug Loom is warped for the first panel and all that is left is dyeing a final few colors.

I often let ideas for tapestries roll around in my head for months or years. My days are very full with teaching





and I don't have the time I'd love to have to weave. So it can take a long time for one tapestry to be completed, especially large-format ones. One of my favorite parts of weaving tapestry is dyeing the wool. I love experimenting with color and often dye many samples before I commit to larger amounts for

a tapestry. In my larger-format work, I usually dye the yarn for each tapestry as I design it. This often means I end up with a lot of left-over yarn that I either use for teaching or for smaller tapestries. I love the process of making tapestry and this is a part of all my days whether I'm teaching, writing, weaving, or hiking.
