

How does colour work on the weaversbazaar website?

At first glance it may not be easy to follow they way we organise yarn colours on the weaversbazaar website. But there is a method to behind it which we hope helps with selecting colours that will work in your projects, that go together well and that can be blended easily. The method we use is based on a 24 segment colour wheel in the Colour Tool we use ourselves and sell here Every colour we dye has a known place on this colour wheel. On the website we show the 24 segments



in pairs and these are the 12 colour groups on the website and they can be seen <u>here</u>. If you click on any of these groups you will then see all the colours in that part of the colour wheel, but to help find the right colour we group them as either a

Pure Colour	The colour with the greatest saturation in each hue there is one for each segment of the colour wheel and these are the colours you can see on the wheel above
Tints	Pure colours lightened with white
Shades	Pure colours darkened with black
Tones	Pure colours darkened with grey

Pure colours, tints, shades and tones all have their own effects and impacts in a tapestry and an article in our library, called <u>4 ways to use a Colour Tool</u>, talks about how this works. The article also explains how the colour tool can be used to pick colours.

Many of our colours are directly related to individual colour samples in the colour tool. So the yarn colour matches one of the small squares of colour in the colour tool. We have a chart (Chart 2 on this page in the knowledge zone) which gives the page and square number in the colour tool for many of our colours. We hope this information will help with the selection of colours but it also relates to a question in this months Q&A Corner, on which weaversbazaar colours best match a 12 segment colour wheel. See the answer below.

If you prefer to select your colours intuitively then all the available colours are listed and shown on this page on the website. By using the button before the colours a pdf of all our current colours can be compiled and printed off – handy if you want to mark it up to show what you have in your stocks.

Website Poll

Our July Poll question was "Have you woven Tapestry Diaries or Tapdoodles (weaving without a plan letting imagination run free)?"

Tapestry diaries are daily/weekly small weavings often across a single set of warps so the Tapestry grows over time. Tapdoodling is a term Lin first heard used by Jill Garrett a lovely weaver from the Isle of Wight who coined the expression for any small piece of work you just sit down to do without any planning, so letting your imagination run free. Lots of us do it but probably didn't know there is a word for it! You can see the results below with a fifth of voters never having tried either – so maybe something new to consider trying just to see how you get on and let your creativity run free? Almost half of us (46.7%) do carry out some form of random weaving either unplanned or with a theme or image in mind.

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Techniques and Troubleshooting

A new section which will focus on techniques and troubleshooting common problems.

In our recent newsletter survey, lots of you provided great feedback particularly in the comments section of questions. One of the themes that kept popping up throughout the survey was the desire for more information about Tapestry Techniques and how to troubleshoot when things don't work as they should. So, we thought we would introduce a new newsletter section where we would focus on these areas by highlighting helpful resources and courses available that deal with specific techniques and problems.

This month we will highlight a very useful troubleshooting video from Rebecca Mezoff which addresses shedding problems, one of the most common problems that tapestry weavers struggle with. This happens when our wefts are not moving in opposite directions, and we can't move a weft where we need to for our design without putting two wefts into the same shed. This video teaches you one solution for fixing this common shedding issue. Watch the video at https://tinyurl.com/4mn44sun. Q & A Corner

"Which yarn colours should I use to make a wheel of 12 pure colours"

This is a question we have often been asked, particularly when someone wants to include a rainbow or a range of colours spanning the colour spectrum in their work.

At the top of the newsletter is an explanation of how we work with colour and identify and categorise the yarn colours we stock.

But after much deliberation the three primary colours are easy to identify in our range and they will be these 3 pure colours; Yellow 4, Bice Blue 4, and Ruby 4. Then it gets a bit harder but I suggest for the secondary colours have a look at Viridis 4, Mallow 4 and Orange 4

Finally for the tertiary colours look at Nyanza 4, Turquoise 4, Hyacinth 3, Magenta 4, Cinnabar 4 and Sunburst 5.
All these colours together complete the colour spectrum.

I know several readers have been working on these kinds of projects so it would be wonderful to see the work and hear which colours were used. Please let us know and also if you found a different combination works.

Anne Stabell is a contemporary Norwegian artist who uses open warps in her tapestry. Before specialising in tapestry, she worked as a costume and stage designer. She



creates amazing large pieces woven with nylon on a wool warp using only natural dyes and often dyes several fibres together in a skein, with beautiful results. Nature has always been her main inspiration.
