Farewell Message from Matty - I am both amazed and proud to be writing this 'farewell'. Amazed because



starting a business in the twilight of my years was something I had never in a million years anticipated doing, and proud because of the great success Lin and I have made of it. Sitting in the West Dean tapestry studio, during that Summer School in 2008, Lin and I had glibly enthused about running a yarn-based business. The initial creative drive that brought weaversbazaar into existence two years later was the result of us seeing an opportunity to supply the material requirements of the tapestry weaving community – but we very soon realised that it was also a means through which our shared passion for woven tapestry art could provide support to develop that community. I think it is that shared vision that has kept weaversbazaar going despite Lin and I living in different parts

of the country and through a decade in which we have both had to deal with significant personal issues. No longer being involved in the day-to-day activities of running weaversbazaar will leave a space in my life which other things are already queuing up to fill (not least of which is tapestry weaving! See image on left of 'On waking materialised' a new tapestry from Matty), but I shall miss the regular calls and Skype exchanges with Lin (plus the occasional meeting at Cobham Service Station on the M25). I wish weaversbazaar Ltd every success over the next decade and beyond and I know it will continue to flourish in Lin's very capable hands. Both Matty and Lin would like to thank you all for your continued support which has bought weaversbazaar this far and will sustain it through the next chapter

The Next Chapter – one more admin item then we will get back to weaving. In order to close weaversbazaar the partnership and re-open as weaversbazaar Ltd we will closed from **April 4**th **to 6**th and the website will not be able to take your orders. On the 7th though we will be up and running again. Coffee Break: The tapestries of Dom Robert – Rebecca Mezoff

Recently posted by Rebecca Mezoff this is a comprehensive look at the work of Dom Robert which Rebecca saw when she visited France last year. As well as seeing some of his pieces in other places she was able to include a trip to the Dom Robert Museum in Soréze. Dom Robert entered a Benedictine abbey in 1930 and was later ordained a priest in 1937. He was inspired to become a tapestry cartoon designer after meeting Jean Lurcat in 1941. His designs are very distinctive, joyful and full of colour. All his work was focussed on nature and the article includes many photos both of his cartoons and the tapestries woven from them as well as describing his working methods. <u>https://tinyurl.com/vpptv4d</u>.

Artist Profile: Diedrick Brackens



"On the first day of weaving class as an undergraduate at the University of North Texas, in Denton, the artist Diedrick Brackens walked into his classroom to find 30 looms lined up in perfect rows in front of a cabinet filled with color-coordinated yarn, like a "rainbow in the back,"

he remembers. He was instantly hooked." He makes intricate weavings mainly from cotton, a material he uses for its versatility and ability to take colour. Many of his tapesties also incorporate the historical implications of that material. <u>https://tinyurl.com/s2g4uxe</u>

Their current collection houses many objects spanning thousands of years of Egyptian culture, including some of the world's oldest surviving textiles. 3000-year-old textiles are amongst the finest ever discovered in Europe from the Bronze Age. Archaeologists from the University of Cambridge have discovered more than 100 fragments of textile, unspun processed fibre and yarn. Some of the fabrics are very finely woven and many of
