Product Updates

This month there are a few quick weaversbazaar updates

Sample Cards – The latest version of our Sample Cards is now available. This is version 0821 the main change is we have removed three colours that are no longer available but an alternative for each has been added these are:

Withdrawn Colour	Replacement Colour
Vivid Purple (0034)	Periwinkle 4 (0134)
Buttermilk (0045) & Terracotta (0062)	Terracotta 1 (0159)
Sludge Green (0060)	<u>Sunburst 8</u> (0122)

Tapestry Needles – we have added another size (18) which has a larger eye than the 24 and 22 tapestry needles so these will accommodate even our heavy yarns. We have also added some Smyrna/Wool needles which have angled but blunt tips which are helpful when sewing up slits or sewing warp ends down to the back of a tapestry.



- Velcro otherwise known as hook and loop tape and commonly used for hanging tapestries we are selling the two types separately so you only need to buy what you need. Our original tapes are white and 2cm wide and we have now added a 5cm wide hook tape which is good for fixing to a strong wooden wall baton. The needles and Velcro can be found in the <u>accessories</u> section.
- Finally for anyone who prefers to sew with natural thread we have 4 colours of Gutermann 100% cotton sewing thread <u>here</u>

A Day in the Weave of Anne Jackson

This month we are privileged to have an insight into the creative practice and weaving life of Anne Jackson who is giving us a view here not only into her weaving day but also the special technique she has developed for her pieces. So here in her own words and images is "A Day in the Weave of Anne Jackson".

Covered work and cat



As I come into my studio space first thing, I find this is what I have to contend with. My mischievous cat, Spindle, has taken to sleeping on top of my work; so I have to keep it covered overnight. He likes lying up there while I'm working as well. I'm not sure I need to have him so close to me when I'm trying to get on, but he has different ideas.



Small works



Yesterday I spent several hours hanging the small works I made during lockdown, in our local open studio event. It's a mixed group show and I'm quite pleased with how my work looks in the space, now I'm back presenting it to the outside world.



Starting view



This is my starting view for today. What I make is called knotted tapestry. It's a hybrid of Gobelins woven tapestry technique and knotting. I developed it a long time ago, after studying woven tapestry at Art College and then incorporating the kind of work I'd been doing previously as a self-taught maker. I'm still really pleased with this as a fabric; as you can see it's a different approach, because I work downwards instead of upwards, and but in terms of classic tapestry method, I always make the cartoon as a starting point. I use elaborate colour-blending of cotton, linen & synthetic yarns in the weft. The warp is cotton, (17 wpi) which I use both doubled and split in the same tapestry; you can see this effect in the photo of the fly-image, along with all the dust etc. that accumulates temporarily on the working surface.



Fly closeup



This tapestry is part of "The Witchcraft Series", my long-term project. It's a continuing suite of tapestries on the subject of witch-persecution & prosecution, mostly in the south of England so far. The history of witch-trials in this country is very interesting. It's a kind of slightly hidden narrative; it's seen as a bit disreputable as history, partly I suppose because it's about hysteria and belief and fear, and not about kings and battles and things that are very well documented. The trial documents are about the only source we have for a lot of witch trials, and I try to illustrate the beliefs they demonstrated, and the stories that made up the prosecutions.





I've been interested in text in tapestry for a long time. I enjoy trying to create accurate letter forms in my technique. In this case, the text at the top of the work reads "The witchcraft of Elizabeth Styles of Bayford, widow". I photograph or scan the text directly from the trial document and then try to reproduce the letter forms, punctuation, etc. I like including an original "voice"; I imagine it speaking, out of its time and my work. I am hoping to finish this tapestry within a year. I get bored after too long working on the same idea and imagery. The small pieces that I've just hung for the Open Studio are mostly studies towards this piece, and are very useful because they are much quicker to get out into public view. Also, it's nice to move more nimbly from one idea to the next. But I also love working on this larger scale, approximately 170 x 150 cm. I think scale is one of the things that make woven tapestry a powerful medium.


Stop press:
