Adjustable frames update



Following feedback from customers we have reverted to our original design of adjustable tapestry frame with the threaded metal side rods. These are still sized at a generous 50cm x 50cm and enable weaving in progress to be neatly wrapped up and put in a suitcase for easy travelling.

In addition, we have a limited run of a slightly smaller version of our distinctive adjustable frame. This is 40.5cm wide x 50cm high. All the same features – there are **just five left** and you can find both types of frame on our <u>Equipment</u> page

Book review: 'Painting with Yarns: Let's weave a tapestry' by Hilary Charlesworth.



This small self-published booklet, written by Hilary Charlesworth, is a useful introduction to tapestry weaving, covering all the basic techniques including a page or two at the end on translating designs into tapestries. The weaving instructions are clear and well written with some excellent photographs to illustrate the techniques. It also shows what a traditional English tapestry weaver would call slightly less orthodox methods, such as warping up in a

figure of eight and simply knotting two warps together to hold the wefts in place. Consequently, an interesting booklet even for those who already know a little about weaving. Contact Hilary direct if you want more information: <u>hilary@totallytextiles.co.uk</u>

Coffee Break & Artist Profile: Olga de Amaral



Born in Bogotá, Colombia, Olga de Amaral studied fabric art at the Cranbrook Academy of Art in Michigan. Amaral is a renowned artist whose evolving technique, incorporating fibre, paint, gesso and precious metals transforms two-dimensional textiles into sculptural works that seamlessly

integrate art, craft, and design. In their engagement with materials and process her works become essentially unclassifiable and self-reflexively authentic. Amaral is an important figure in the development of post-war Latin American abstraction. Her creation of "off stretcher" works, using non-traditional materials, acquires greater historical resonance with each passing year. Her <u>website</u> not only presents images of her work but also a 16 minute video entitled 'The House of my Imagination' – which makes for a great coffee break.

Community Tapestry Weaving in Cambridge, UK



A huge tapestry is being woven by hundreds of Cambridge people as part of a city-wide art project. So far, around 200 people from all over Cambridge have had a part in weaving the tapestry, which is based on a design by pupils from The Grove Primary School. Julie Taylor, a


Textile Gallery





Barb Cove sent us some images of her recent experimental work. She says "I love to play and see what can be done with a warp and weft. I have felt that I would like more 3dimensional work, and so I thought I would see if using fabric stiffener would enable this. I was excited with the results, and the painting the weaving added another dynamism. This play lead onto creating the Black & Gold Grids (top left). After this I wanted to use another colour palette; greys, golds, yellows, white, silvers to create another series of works. The experimentation continues, and 'Rolling (top right)', 'Complete (bottom left)', and 'Opening (bottom right) are the outcome of this further exploration. This is a slow process as you must allow for drying times, but then Tapestry Weaving





is a slow process. This process suits my reflective nature as I ponder the many possibilities of what I can do.
