Tapestry Spotlight: Jane Freear-Wyld



Jane, a long-established tapestry weaver, is a member of both the American Tapestry Alliance (ATA) and the British Tapestry Group. She trained as a teacher in the early 1970s, where her studies included weaving and spinning - mainly designing cloth. She later discovered, and fell in love with, tapestry weaving. Her design development is now completely digital. Jane can be heard on Radio 4, 1:30 pm, June 16th, debating with others the subject of 'instant gratification'. She will be demonstrating at Art in Action , 21st – 24th July at Waterperry House and Gardens, near Oxford. Her weave 'Dahlia 1' (left) is currently in the ATA Small Tapestry International 2 Exhibition. She will also have pieces in both 5th International Exhibition of Mini Textile Art, in Kherson, Ukraine, from June 15th -22nd and the 2012 European Tapestry Forum ArtTapestry Touring Exhibition.
