Archie Brennan. 7th December 1931 - 31st October 2019

It is with great sadness and much reflection that we learned of the peaceful death of master-weaver Archie Brennen, on October 31st, 2019. He was born in Roslin, Scotland on December 7th, 1931. Archie has been, for both professional and amateur tapestry weavers alike, an inspiration and a guide for many, many decades. In the UK, Australia and North America, he raised the profile of tapestry art both through his collaborations with other media artist as well as through his own tapestry art. There will undoubtedly be many tributes paid to his extraordinary influence on the re-emergence of tapestry as an art form in the latter half of the 20th century. Our last poll looked at whether tapestry artists incorporated other art forms and media into their work. Whilst almost 17% do not do this, nearly 30% of respondents do draw on embroidery techniques to enhance their weaving and a tantalising 20% use 'other art forms' – it would have been great to know what these are. 10% of those responding to the poll incorporate Macramé into their tapestry art and our recent workshop which explored the integration of tapestry

and macramé certainly proved to be popular. But apart from embroidery and macramé our poll showed that tapestry artists do look to integrating tapestry art with other art forms but at a very limited level. Artist Profile: Tommye McClure Scanlin



Tommye Scanlin is Professor Emerita of the University of North Georgia and has practiced and taught weaving for over 50 years. She is a life member of the Southern Highland Craft Guild and Piedmont Craftsmen, and she is one of the founding members of Tapestry Weavers South. On her

<u>website</u> Tommye says of her work as a tapestry artist," I am an artist who observes and responds to my surroundings for inspiration. My primary artistic medium is handwoven tapestry, an ancient method of working with fibers to create images. As I seek images and ideas to interpret into tapestry, I experience my



surroundings as closely as I can. Photographs, sketches, paintings, and writings all are part of the research I put into my work". Tommye is a great advocate of tapestry diaries – tapestries she weaves every day of the year. Dovecot presents a landmark exhibition exploring the life and work of May Morris, the youngest daughter of William Morris and one of the most significant artists of the British Arts and Crafts movement. The exhibition tells the story of May, who at age 23, took charge of the Morris & Co.

In this first-time collaboration, members of Tapestry Weavers West (TWW) and Tapestry Weavers in New England (TWiNE) present IMPACT: Climate Change, a juried exhibition of contemporary tapestry focusing on this important theme. The exhibition features tapestries that reflect the

artists' concerns about our changing global environment and the ominous consequences of climate change. Details here.

Place Makers Exhibition. Until 6 December 2019. Melbourne, Australia.



'Place Makers' includes the work of eight artists who use textiles to investigate history, self, place and identity. Each artist identifies with a unique cultural heritage; their use of textiles serves as



an anchor point for their personal histories and their contextualisation within the broader Australian milieu. Linked to this exhibition there is an Open Day on 16 November, which includes an afternoon of free demonstrations, workshops and talks with the artists. Details of both are here.

Gossamer. Until 15 December 2019. Margate, Kent, UK

Presented by the Carl Freedman Gallery, this exhibition, curated by artist Zoe Bedeaux, brings together 22 artists who all work with the medium of tights or stockings. The second exhibition at the gallery's new Margate space will feature works from early-twentieth century pioneers, including Man Ray and Louise Bourgeois, through to celebrated figures such as Sarah Lucas and extend to contemporary talent such as Enam Gbewonyo and Ma Qiusha. Environments. Until 1 January 2020. London, UK.



The call out for this exhibition attracted some 900 submissions from artists across the UK and the Republic of Ireland which were then put to a panel of selectors. In terms of materials the chosen works range from digital print, photography, embroidery, assemblage and clay sculpture to pen,

pencil, chalk, oil paint, watercolour and charcoal. While in subject matter they encompass everything from the landscapes of the Scottish Highlands and South Coast to New York City, perspectives on daily life and a wide range of abstract impressions and imagery inspired by nature and popular culture – think cats, monkeys and The Beatles. Barbara Rae RA: Tapestries and Rugs. Until 25 January 2020. Edinburgh, Scotland, UK



Dovecot Studios and Scottish artist Barbara Rae CBE RA have worked together for over 25 years to create 12 rugs and tapestries. To celebrate this creative partnership, Dovecot weavers have created a new tapestry inspired by Rae's exploration of the Northwest Passage in the Arctic

region. Discover the creative process and partnership between Dovecot and Rae including the making of this new tapestry Peel Sound Ice, and two gun-tufted rugs displayed for the first time created in response to the artists' travels to the Painted Desert Arizona. <u>Full details here</u>.

As artists we are often inspired by place and the incredible landscape that surrounds us.

Beautiful rolling hills, dramatic seascapes, the textures and colours of where we come from gives endless inspiration to artists who weave. Regional members of the BTG have taken the joint

theme of weaving water/woven land and have interpreted this in a variety of different techniques. From realistic interpretation of the coastline to concerns over land use and environmental issues, changing seasons within the landscape, mapping coastlines and waterways along with emotional and spiritual places where land meets water are imagined in a variety of materials and weaving styles. <u>Details here</u>.

Given the recent death of Archie Brennan, this initiative by Dovecot Studios is especially important. They have been awarded Open Project Funding from Creative Scotland to create a major new tapestry influenced by Brennan, who started his weaving career at Dovecot Studios as

an apprentice, and later became director of the Studios. Pushing the boundaries of the medium, he developed a unique approach to weaving and tapestry design which is continued by Dovecot weavers today. <u>Details here</u>.
